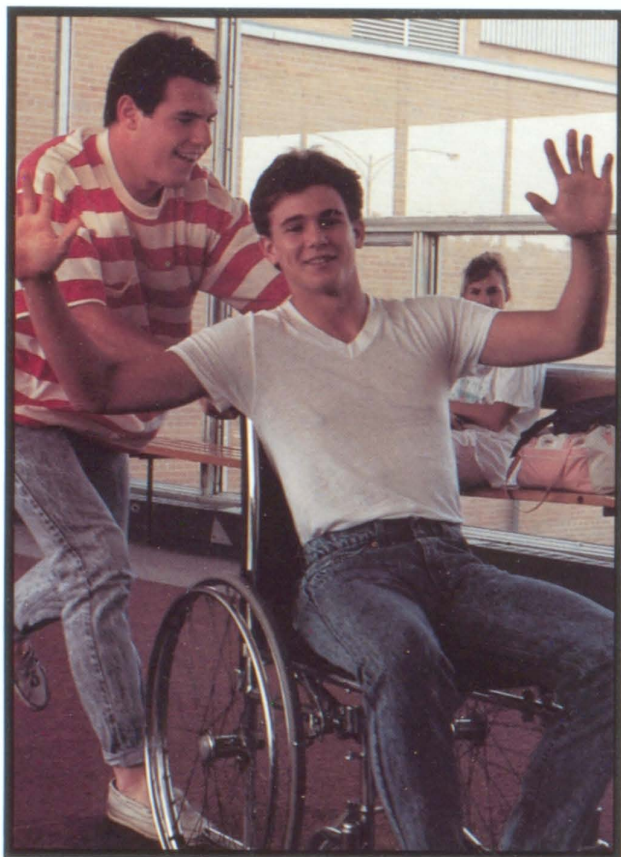
PUTTING THE PIECES TOGETHER

Junior year is also a time for fun. It's the first year they can play Powderpuff. By the third year in high school, most Juniors have turned 16 and have gotten their licenses.

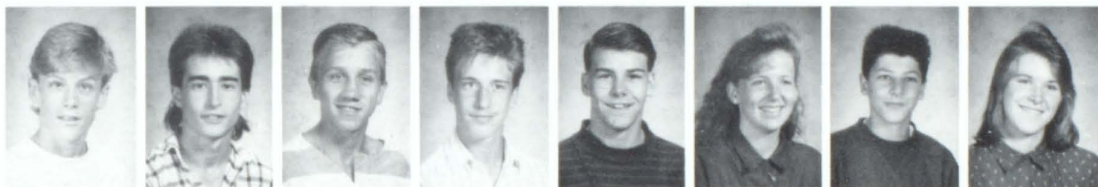

All in all, social studies at Kimball gives everyone a solid background and a positive outlook on the world today.

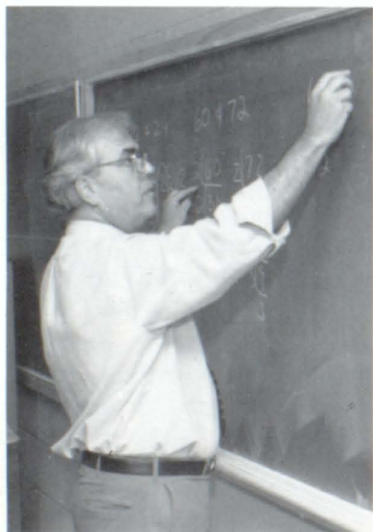

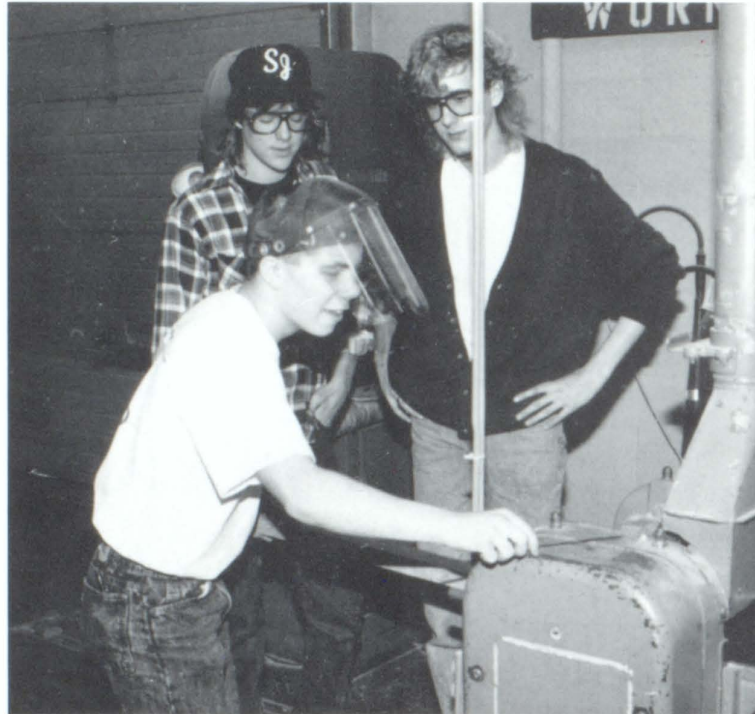

Auto Maintenance provides the fundamentals of the operation and maintenance of cars. This course is a prerequisite for Auto Mechanics.

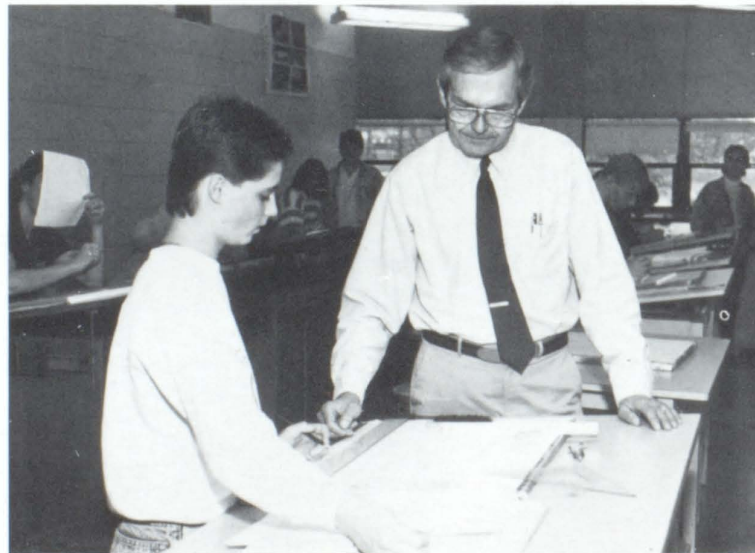

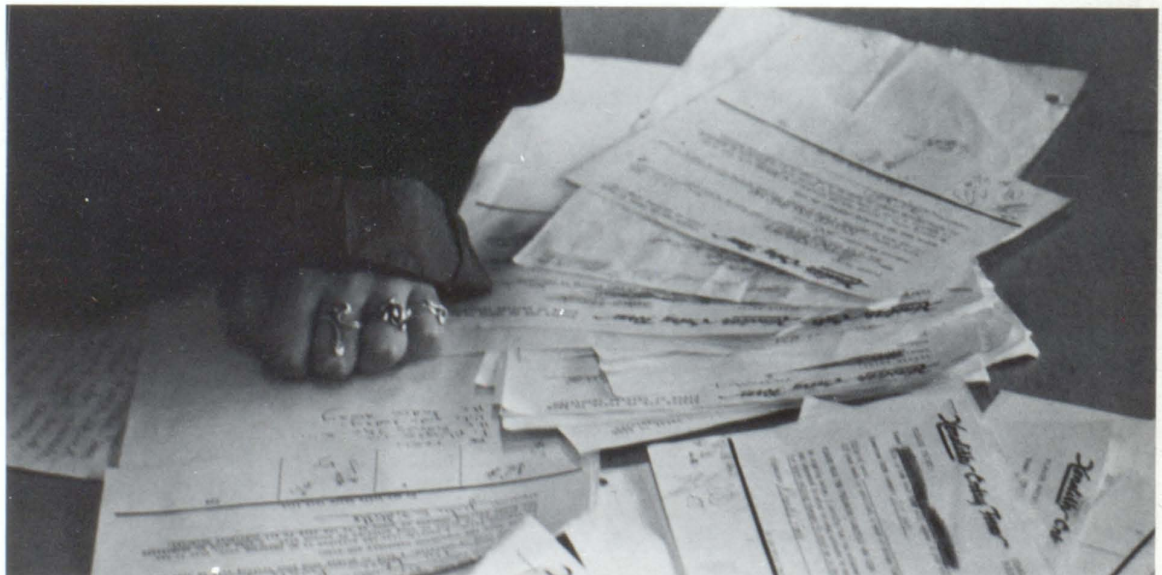

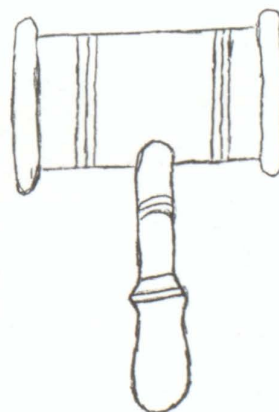

A.V. ACTION

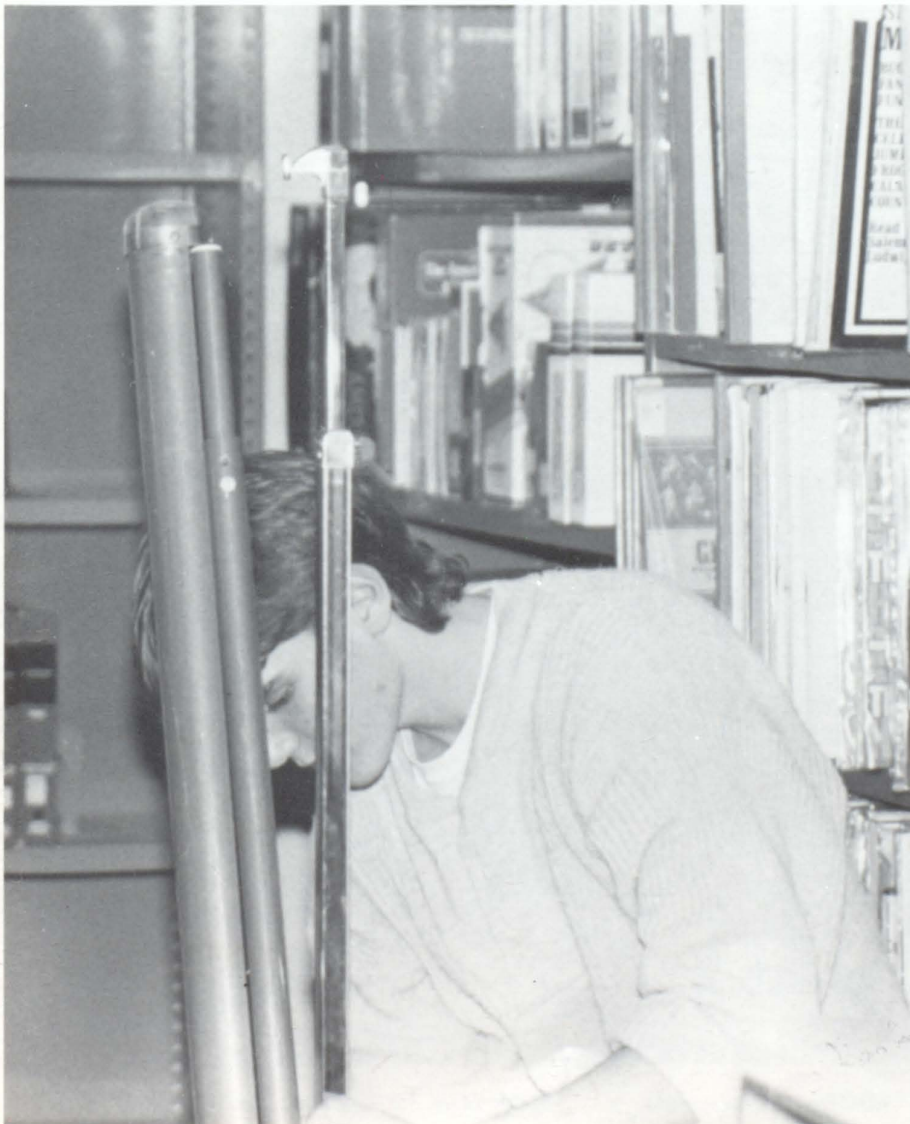

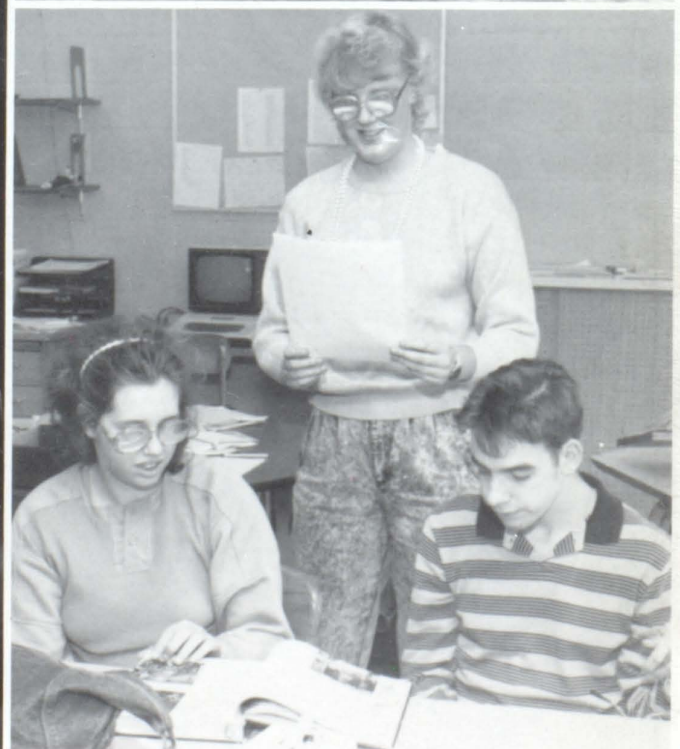

The Special Ed Department at Kimball is run by Mrs. Banasch. The Teacher and therapists involved are as follows: Karen Festa (physically impaired); Jill Palmer (adaptive P.E impaired); Mike Tomlinson (Sturnum for those who know him well) a consultant; Miss Cindy Cook (Mobility); Kay Stedman; (Visually Impaired); Judy Samuel; Trudy Connor; Sue Jones; Linda Catalina; (Secondary POHI program) and Doug Hartle. Teacher aides are: Jim Herrera; John Wilson; Gina Thompson; Nancy Lowry; Barb Cramer and Helen Lung.

There are approximately 150 students involved in the Special Ed Program. These students are from the entire Oakland County area. It's open to the physically impaired, and to the hearing, visually, emotionally and learning disabled.

All students are given the option of following a regular schedule like all other students who plan to graduate and go on to college. If that is not possible for the student then other programs to help them graduate with the same high school diploma are made available. Joyce Nelson is the work-study coordinator and arranges for a job placement.

Sex, Drugs, Violence. Now that I have your attention, I'd like to tell you about television in the 1980's.

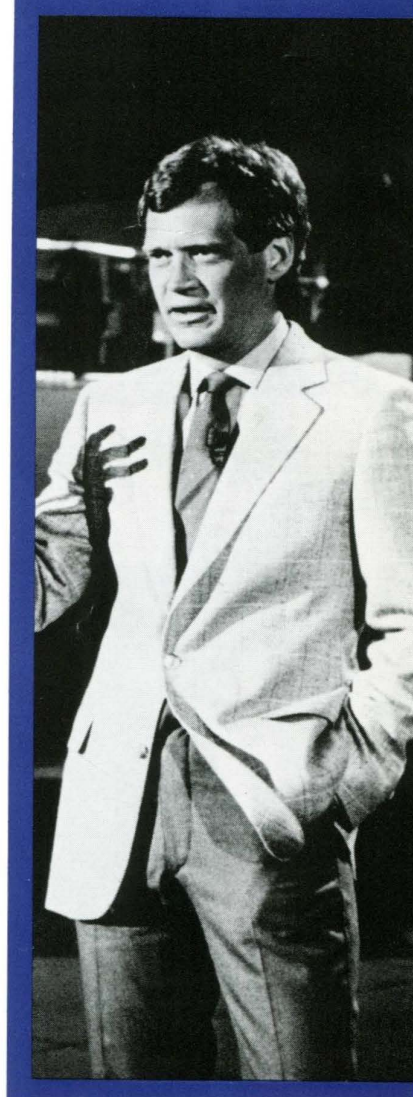

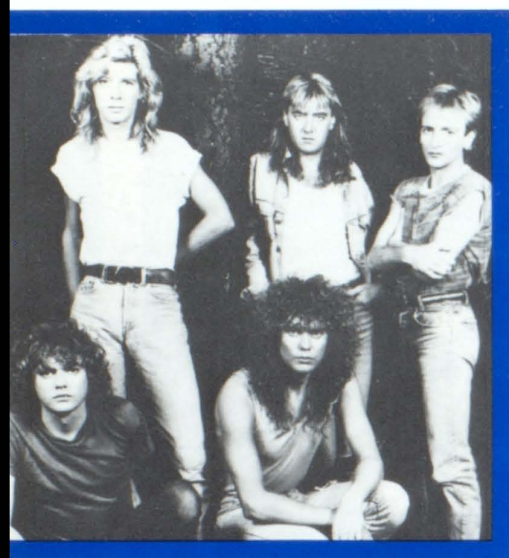

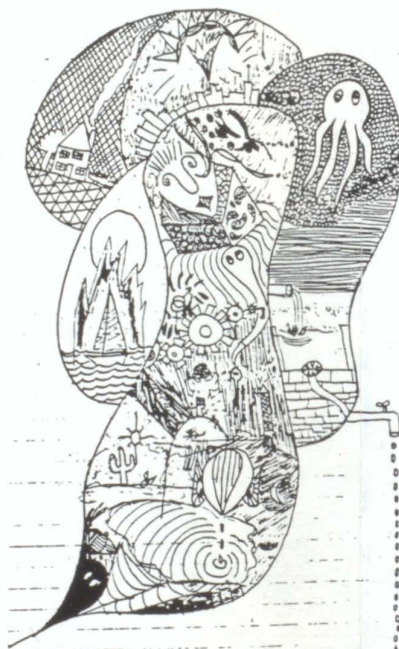

Kimball students compared very well with the **Rolling Stone Magazine** poll, as nearly all our favorites were also listed as national favorites.



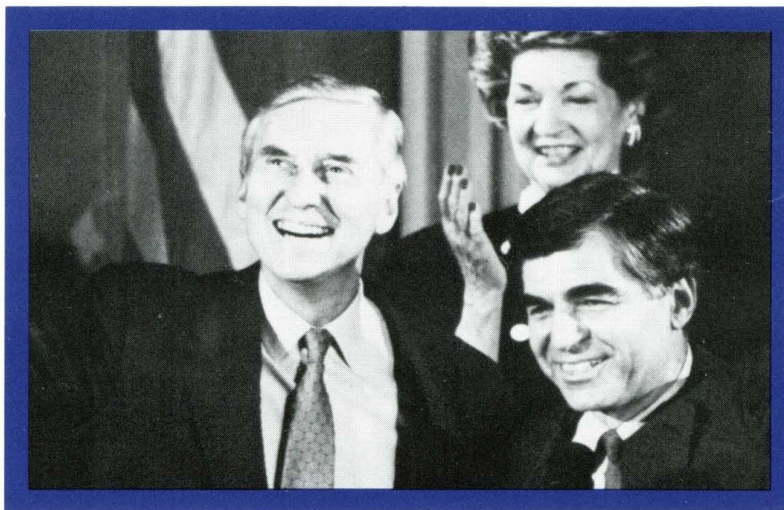
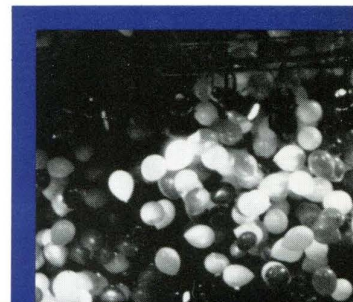
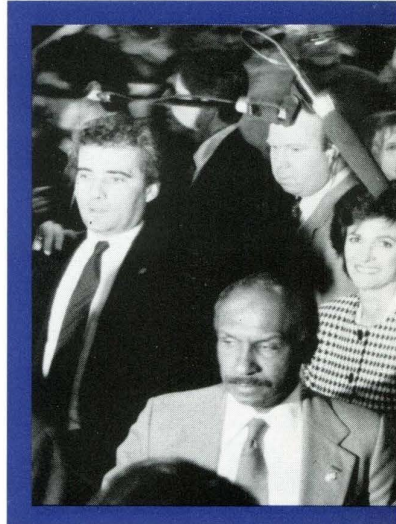
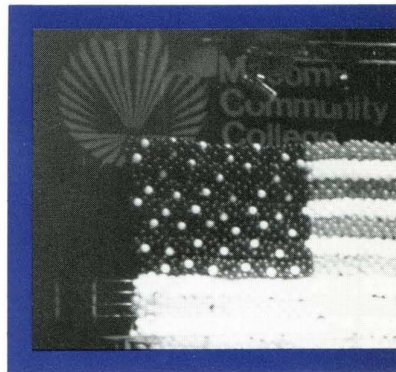
ELECTION COMES TO *Democrats*

And, that was the **Democratic** appearance in our area.



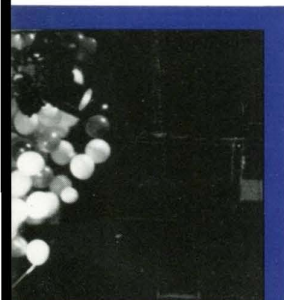
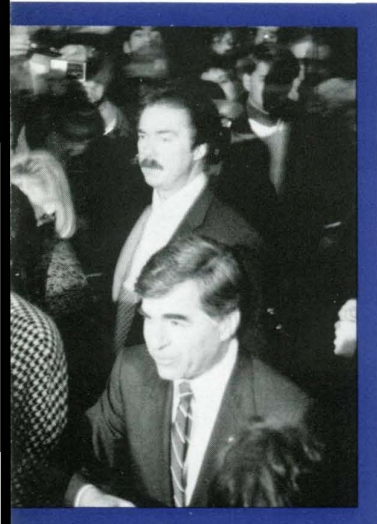
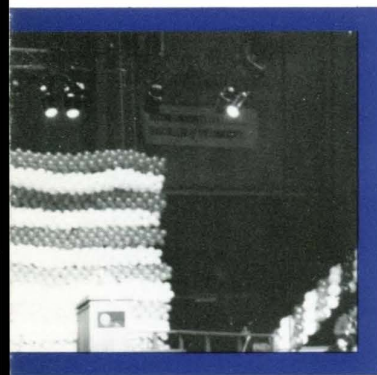

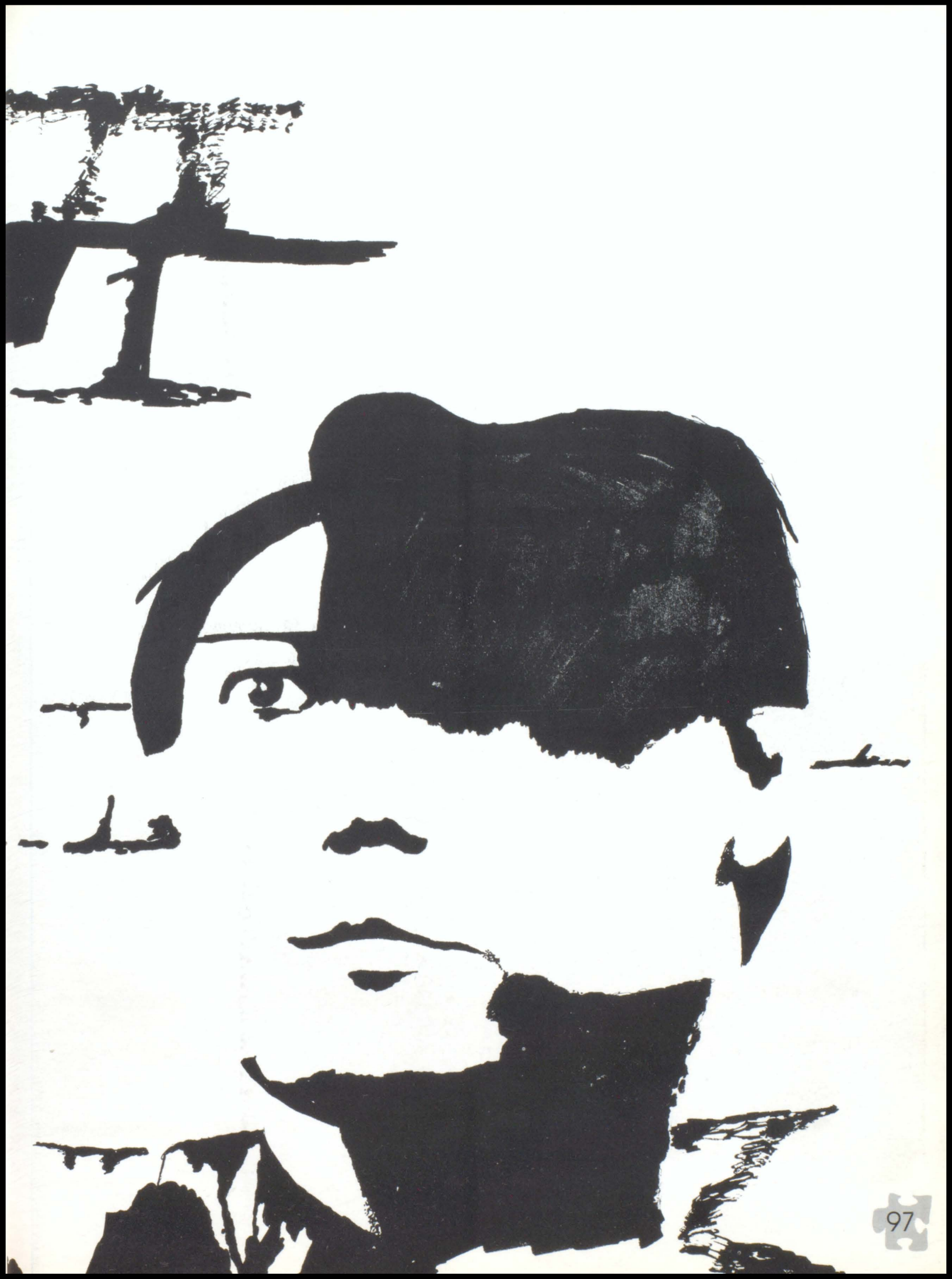
Republicans

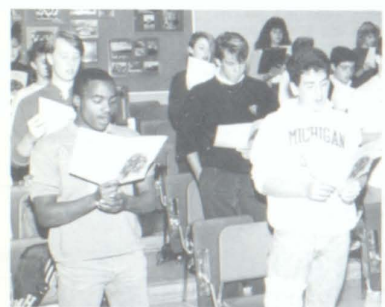

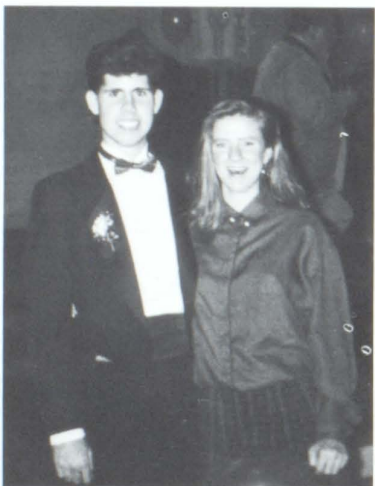

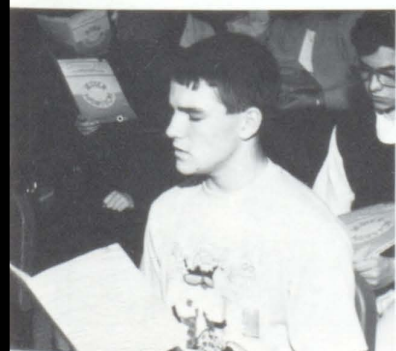


Let the music play!

Next time you participate or do not want to participate in an activity, stop and think of its purpose and all that it stands for. Then go out, get to know new people, and have a good time.



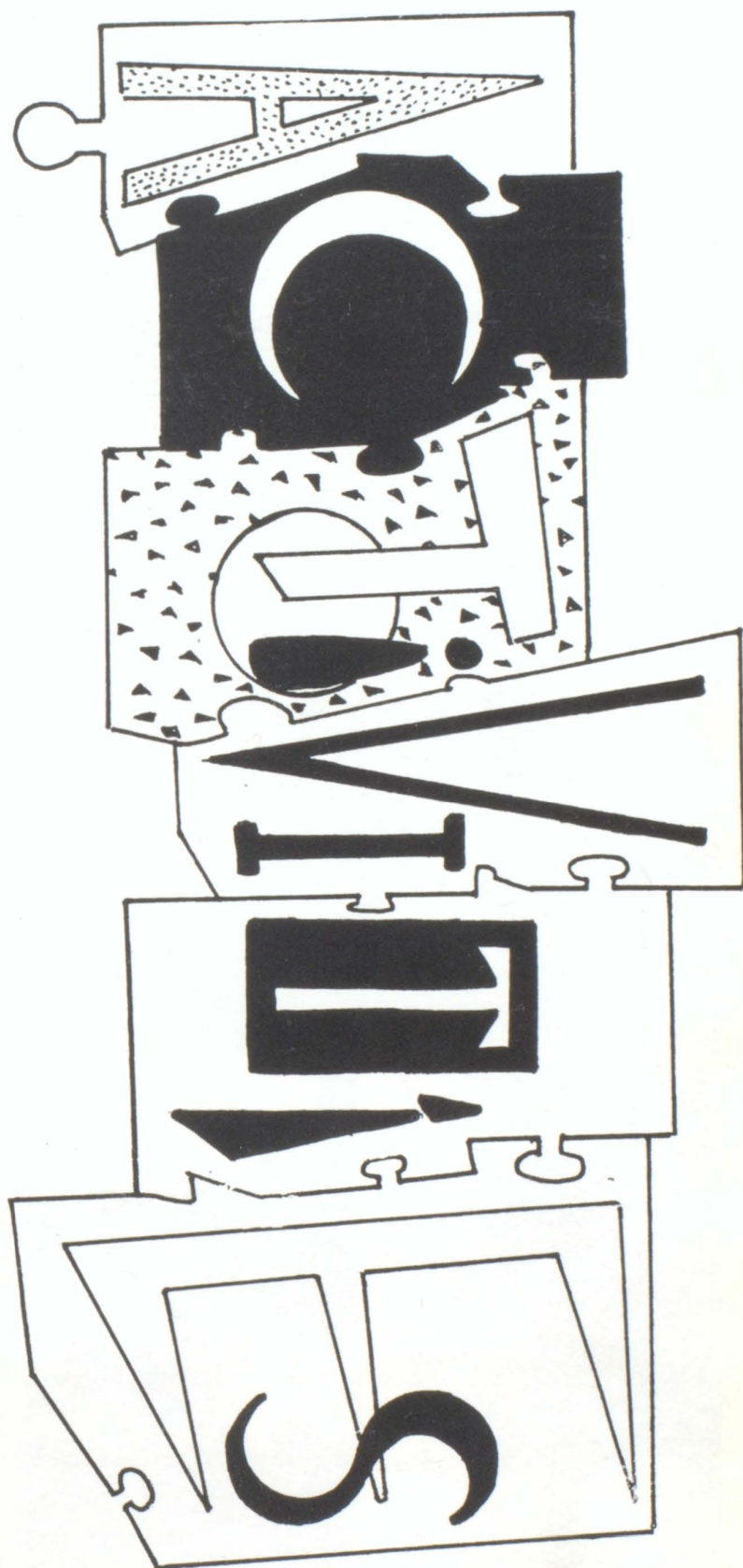

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY





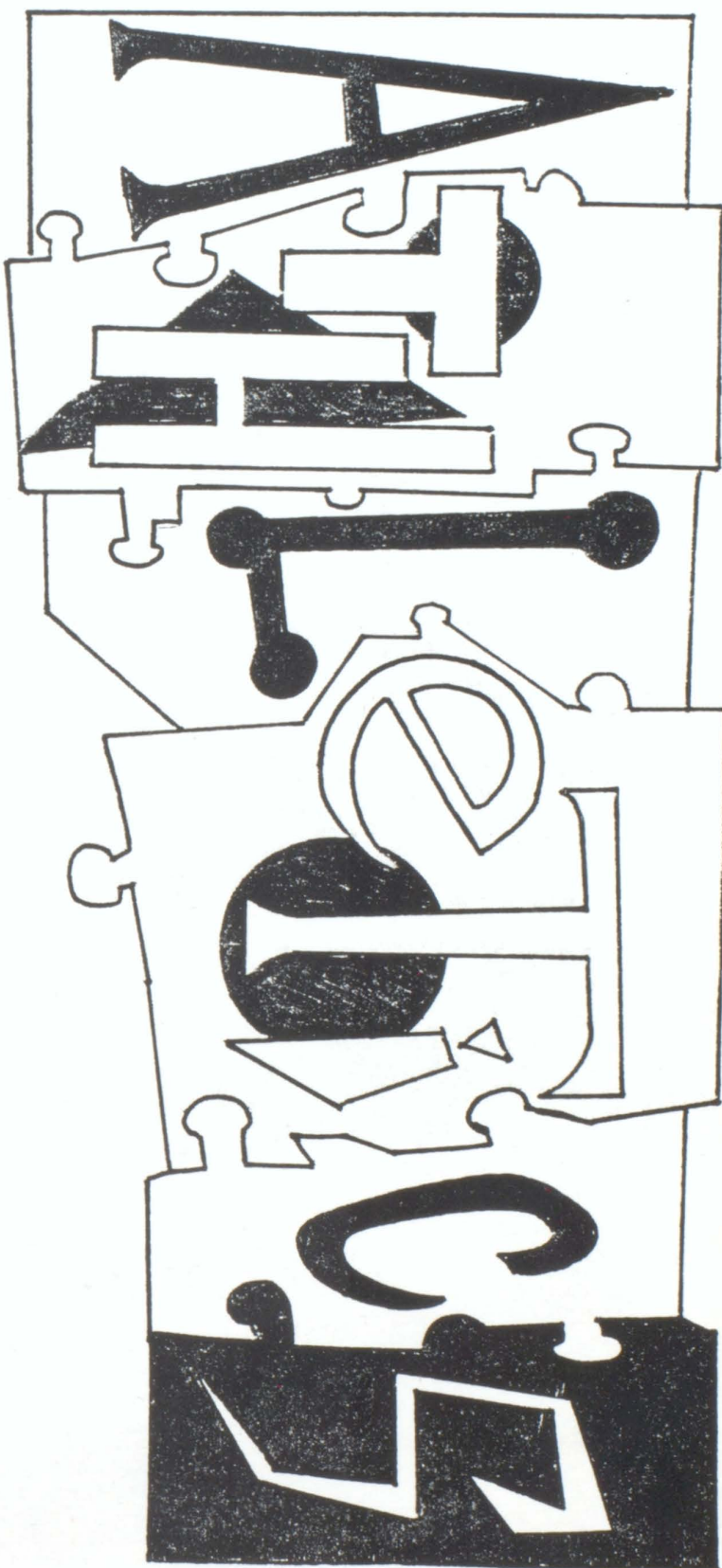
Kimball offers a variety of sports, from cheerleading to cross country. Each sport provides much needed pleasure and fun for the individual as well as the team.

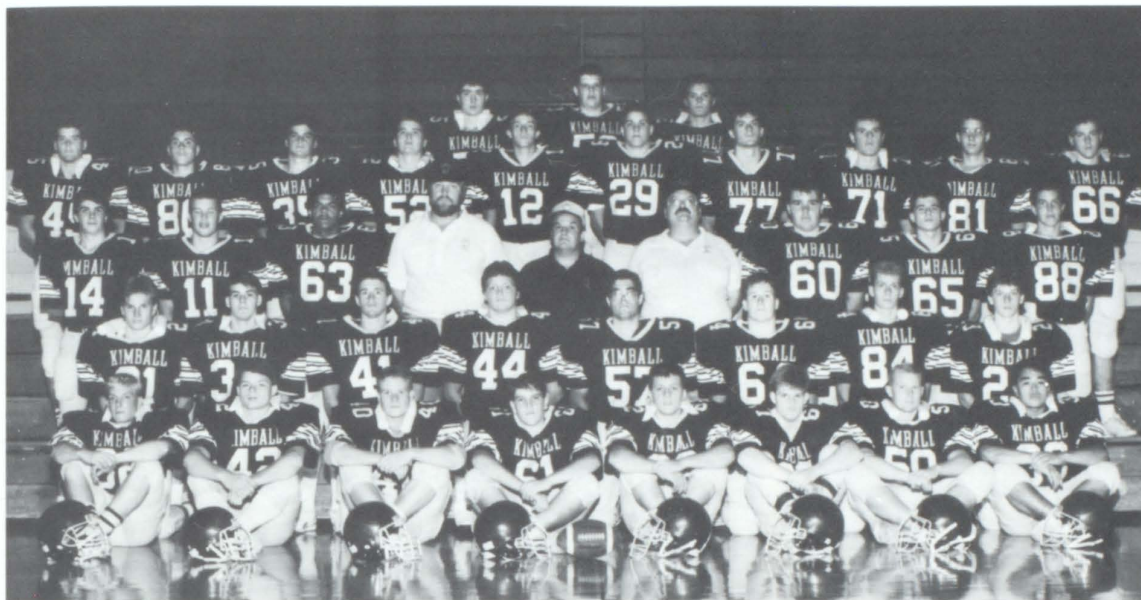

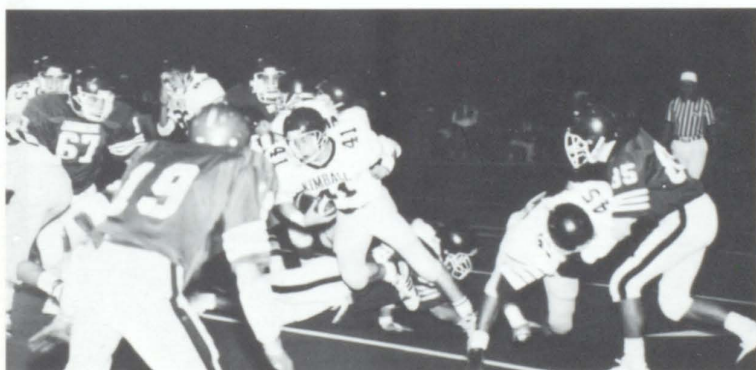

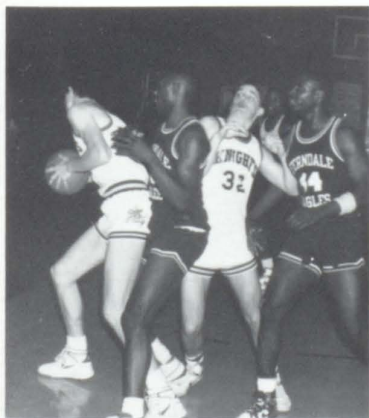

Coach Clouser played basketball in high school and baseball at Butler University. At Eastern University he received a degree in Physical Education with a minor in Science.

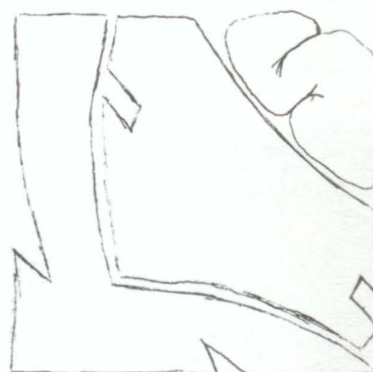
"This year the girls did an outstanding job with sixteen wins setting a new school record," says Coach Clouser.

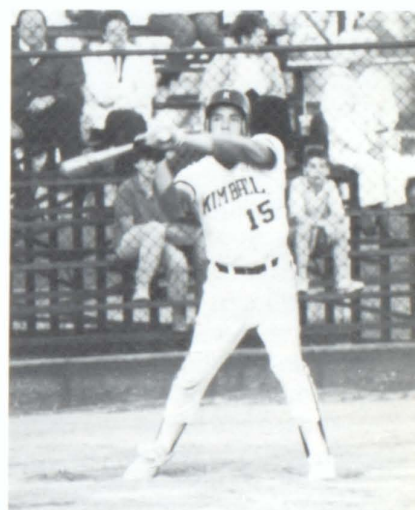

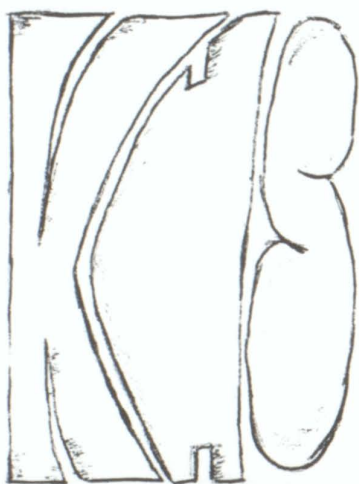

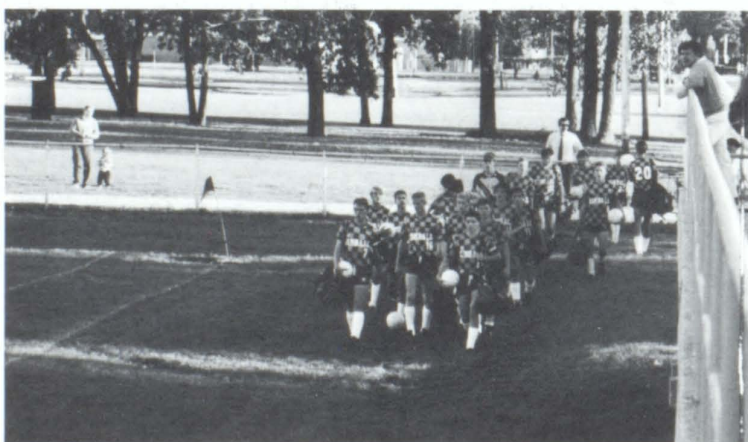

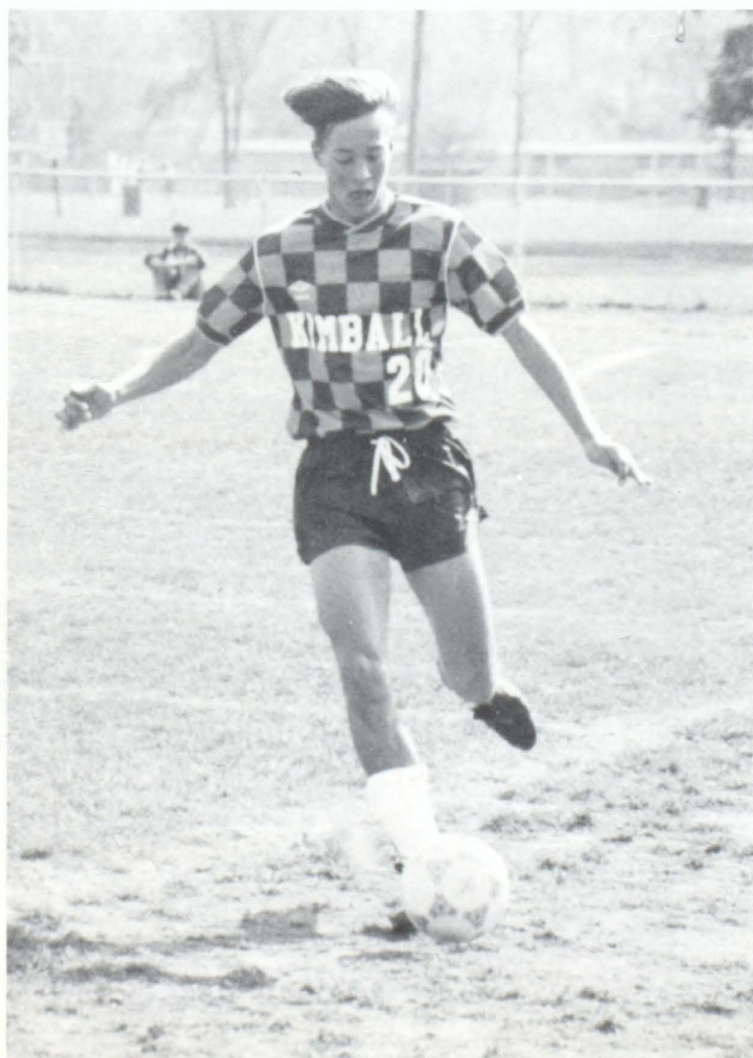

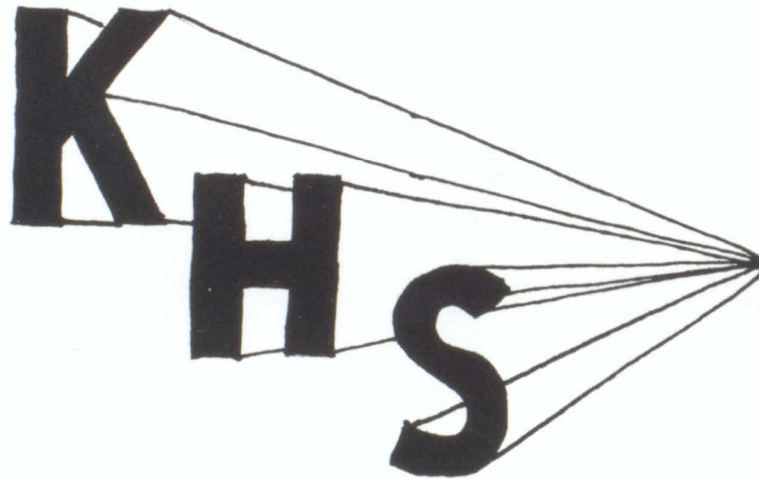

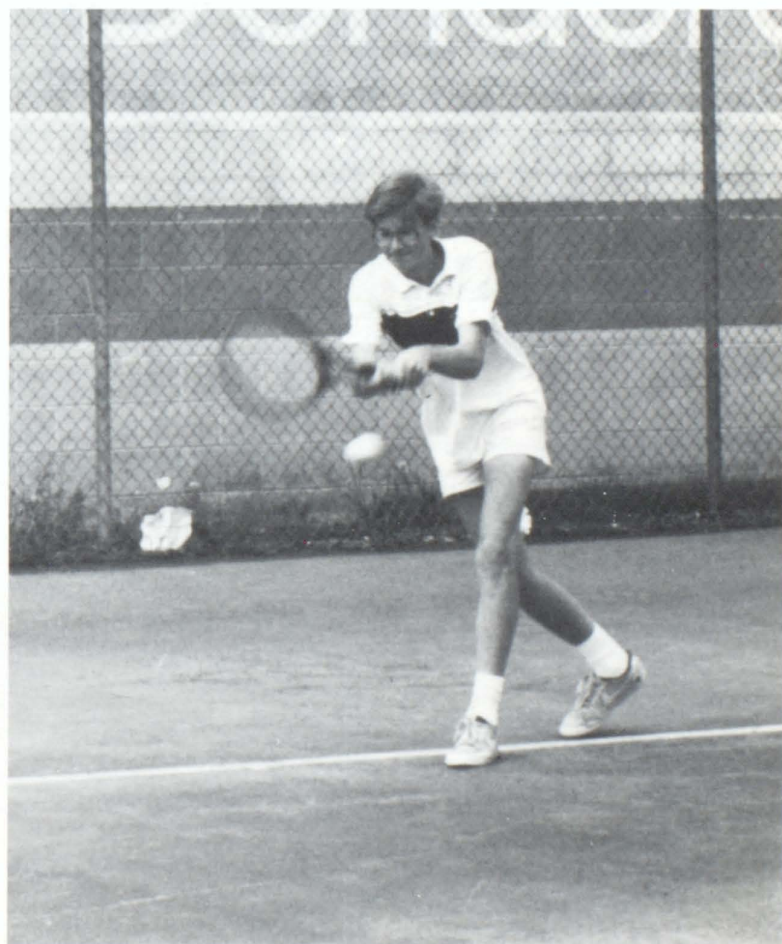

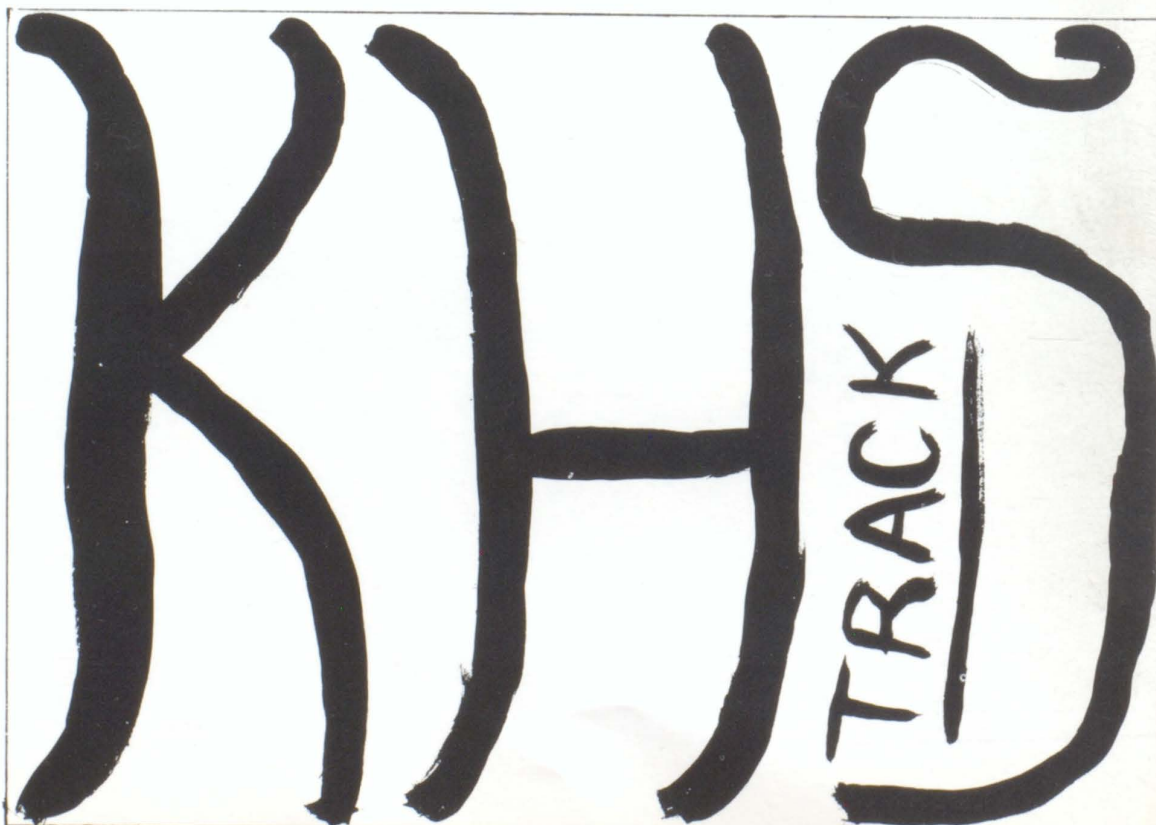
Coach Castle has been working at Kimball for eleven years. He has been the boys' track coach for four years.

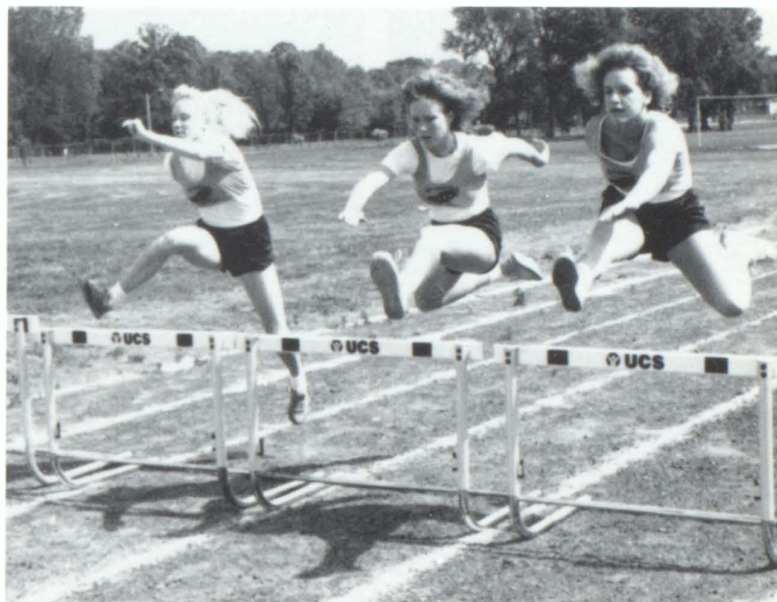

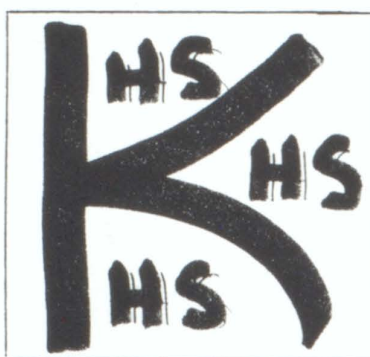

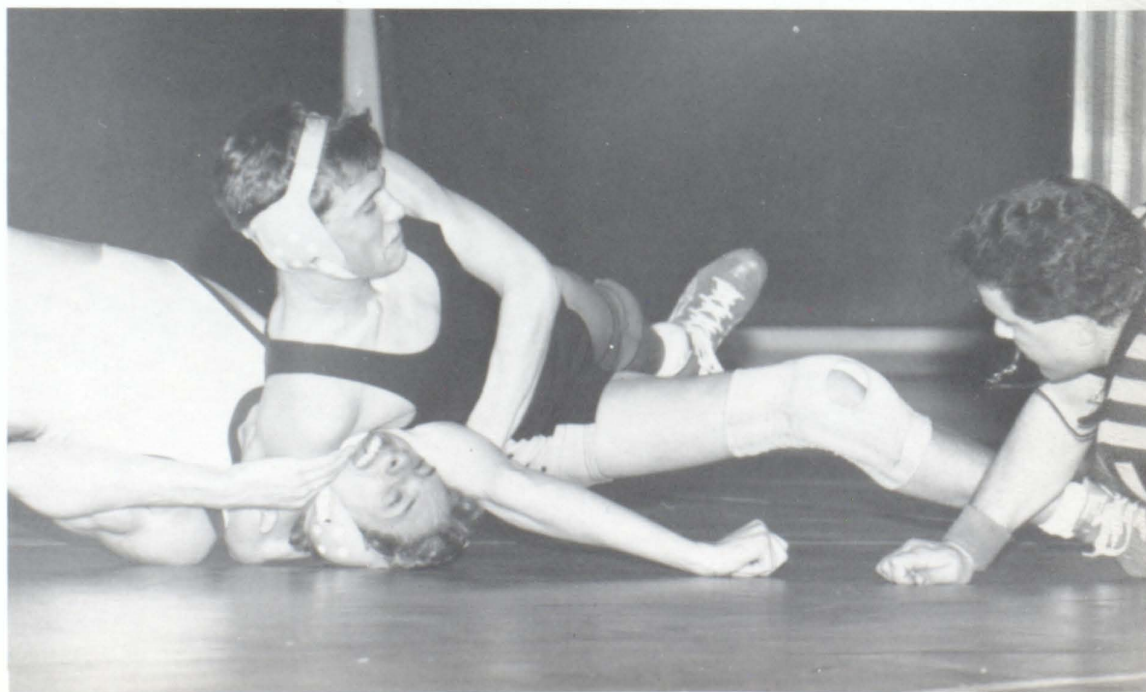

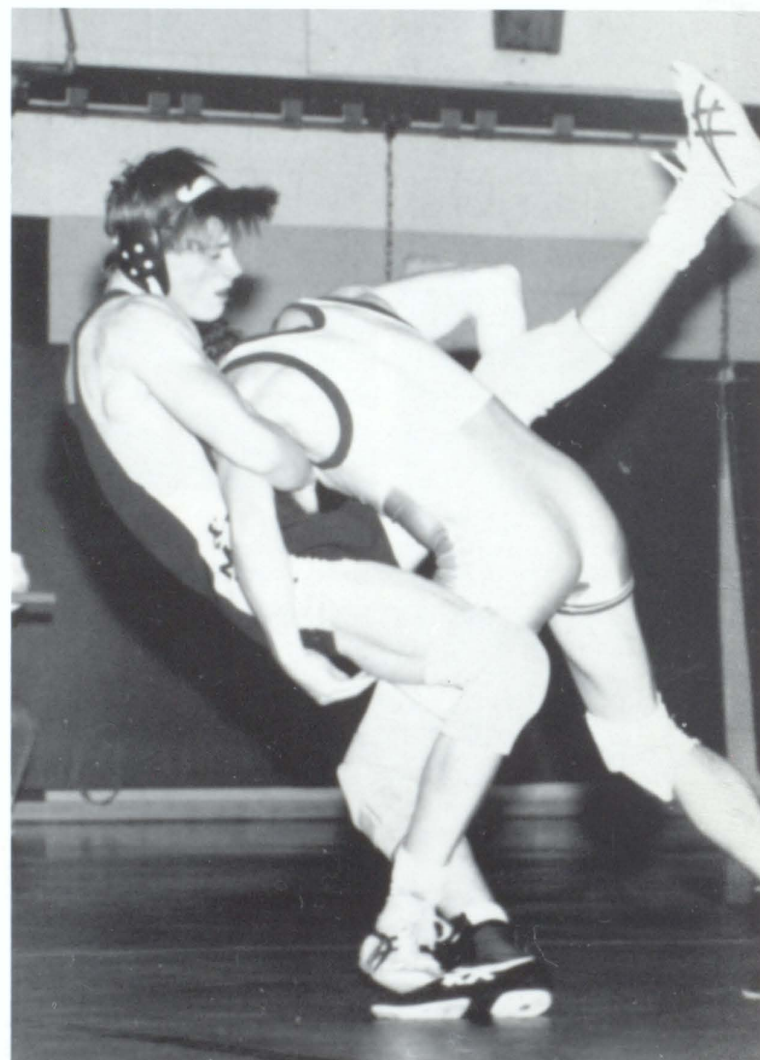

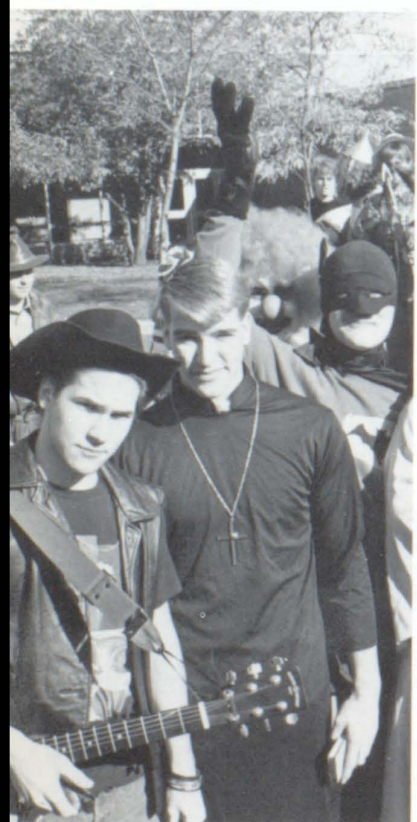
