"My dream job would be to be the chairman of a major automotive company, if not, then a sports commentator," stated senior Didier Trinh.


With all of the pressures that accumulate during Senior year, it's hard to get it all under control and still think about college.

Senior Demir Muftari is getting ready for college, and said that colleges are always bound to "have more parties."











Juniors- Their Dreams and Wishes


Jeff Weeks is another happy-go-lucky eleventh-grader. He plays on the soccer and basketball teams and he always supports his fellow athletes.

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Sophomores Settle In







"I went to my second hour class and sat down but that wasn't the room I was suppose to be in! I was so embarrassed," replied Amber Steward.




The counselors of Kimball fulfill an important role as well. They're the people students can go to with their problems.

McClanaghan says that although she has found teaching challenging, she likes it, "simply because of the energy and the things ahead for high school students."




Mrs. Austin explains the activities some of the kids are involved in. "We go out into the community to learn everyday tasks that help


which gives information about that particular class, surveys of students, and a handful of charming and witty comments.

"Herald has been a learning experience for me. I've met a lot of new people while being on staff. We've had our rough times, but it has only made us stronger," said Chris George.













library system here at Kimball. "I teach the Composition kids the basic learning skills of the library," said Ms. Magid.

Certificate of Merit Awards went to: Sara Alman, Matthew Doyle, Veronica Heide, Matt Slugis, and Rachel Hood.







INDUSTRIAL ARTS TEACHES SKILLS TO LIVE BY





TEMPERATURES, BLOOD PRESSURE, PULSE AND RESPIRATION



School And Work


Do School and Work Actually Mix?

explains about her work-school experience. The Co-op program helps many students get a good start in the work force.







joy," Al Hoerman stated. Courtney Castle agreed, "It was a great experience, and I felt happy to be a part of all of the excitement."




Another Thespian triumph that we'll always remember


Hitting the Slopes







"In S.E.A. we not only help, but we learn and have fun," added junior Diana Valdez.

















Each team had their own philosophy, but what they shared was their determination and togetherness.











“bald is Beautiful” summarized the football season for Coach Terry Power’s Kimball Knights.














TENNIS ANYONE?















Next year, Kimball's Varsity squad will be looking for a few good men to replace the graduating seniors. With the selection they have to choose from, the season will definitely be a success.





